

Compassionate Treatment for Tongue-Tie in Infants, Children, and Adults

Between 4% and 15% of newborn infants have the congenital condition known as tongue-tie. This means the frenum, the tissue connecting the tongue to the floor of the mouth, is excessively short and tight. A similar condition is called lip-tie, when the upper lip is connected too severely to the gums.



This condition can cause a host of problems in infants, including (but not limited to):

- nursing or feeding problems
- failure to thrive
- lip blisters

When someone with a tongue-tie gets older, they can find themselves dealing with:

- poor oral hygiene
- speech impediments
- tight, sore muscles and headaches
- inability to lick an ice cream cone

With a simple laser procedure done in our office, known as a frenectomy, we can resolve the problem with very little discomfort. The procedure is quick and the results amazing.
